1. It was one of the most popular hits recorded by Harry Belafonte. However, it didn't make it to the pop charts for over a year and only then because its name was changed. For ten points, give either name of this appealing tune released on October 20, 1955.

2. Having been implicated in the Crédit Mobilier scandal, James G. Blaine lost the 1876 Republican nomination to him. Although Democrat Samuel J. Tilden seemed to have won the election, a contested vote count led to the negotiated confirmation of this man into the presidency. For ten points, who was the 19th president of the U. S.?

Rutherford Birchard **Hayes**

3. She was the first African American to win the Pulitzer Prize when she won in 1950 for her work of poetry, Annie Allen. For ten points, name the author of Aloneness, To Disembark, In the Mecca, and Maude Martha.

Gwendolyn **Brooks**

4. Easily dissolved in vinegar, these balls of aragonite and conchiolin are abnormalities produced by mollusks that have a shell of nacre. The most prized of these orbs are produced by oriental saltwater mollusks. What are these "gems" that are also Lisa Simpson's sole accessories?

Pearls

5. An American novelist, poet, and critic, he had the honor of being named in 1986 as the first poet laureate of the United States. For ten points, name the author of *All the King's Men*.

Robert Penn Warren

6. She possessed great skill in the working of magic, and her worship lasted long into the Roman era. For 10 points, name this Egyptian goddess of funeral rites who is the divine mother and protectress of the Pharaoh and the wife of Osiris.

Isis

7. "Rejoice, we conquer" was the message that signaled a victory in this 490 BC battle in which the Athenian forces defeated the Persian forces under Darius I. For ten points, identify this battle whose name is lent to a distance running event held in honor of the young man who ran 27 miles. Battle of **Marathon**

8. This country was first mentioned in 1067, and by the early 12th century it had become the center of an independent principality. It is also the seat of a music conservatory, opera and ballet companies, and several theaters and museums. For ten points, name this city, located on the Svisloch River that is the capital of Belarus.

Minsk

9. It was invented by an English trumpet player named John Shore in 1711 and has been used in physics and acoustical experiments. For ten points, what is this small two-pronged metal device used by musicians to provide a fixed pitch by which to tune instruments?

10. It was today in 1803 that the Senate ratified this document with a vote of twenty-four to seven. The Emperor of France offered to sell some prime real estate for less than three cents per acre in order to generate much needed cash. For ten points, what is this treaty that doubled the size of the United States and paved the way for westward expansion beyond the Mississippi?

11. The stories he wrote for Fun and Figaro magazine under the pen name Dod Grile were published under the title Cobwebs from an Empty Skull. For ten points, identify this author whose most famous work was originally titled the Cynic's Wordbook but later known as <u>The Devil's Dictionary</u>.

Ambrose **Bierce**

12. At a scientific convention, during a lecture by Einstein on his theory of relativity, he stormed out of the room declaring his disbelief in what was being said. He was, in fact, one of the strongest opponents to the theory of relativity. However, he is perhaps better known for being the first scientist to develop an accurate atomic model for Hydrogen, although it does not work for more complex atoms. For ten points, identify this Danish physicist.

Niels **Bohr**

13. The symptoms for this infectious disease are typical of both allergies and other diseases, which makes the illness difficult to diagnose with certainty. Studies of this disease have suggested that due to the lack of antibody binding sites on the virus and the sheer number of variations of the virus that a vaccine against it would be rather impractical. What is this illness, the leading cause of absenteeism at work and at schools?

common cold

14. The term was coined by Gertrude Stein and used in Ernest Hemmingway's The Sun Also Rises. For ten points, identify this term used to describe the American expatriate writers during the 1920s and 1930s.

Lost Generation

15. United States opposition to this treaty was lead by Henry Cabot Lodge, and was fueled by a long-lasting sense of isolationism in the US. For ten points, identify this treaty, considered by many historians to be the worst treaty in history, which ended World War I.

Section III Category Bonuses

This year the bonuses are labeled with the name of a movie. The bold face word or words in the title of the movie will give you a clue as to what the bonus is about, so choose carefully. For example, a bonus titled An American Werewolf in **Paris**, in which Paris is in bold print, would have something to do with the city of Paris or any related cities named Paris. Have fun with this section.

If neither team correctly answers the toss-up, then the bonus questions will be up for grabs on the next question.

Toss Ups

3. The themes of this author center around the conflicts of young and creative artists searching for identity, as in his first work, *Beneath the Wheel*. For ten points, identify this German-born Swiss winner of the 1946 Nobel Prize in Literature for such works as *Demian*, *Siddhartha*, and *Steppenwolf*.

Herman **Hesse**

4. This work, an important formulation of the philosophy of Stoicism, reveals the author's belief that the moral life leads to tranquillity, and stresses the virtues of wisdom, justice, fortitude, and moderation. For ten points, what is this compendium of 12 books of moral precepts written in Greek by the Roman Emperor and philosopher Marcus Aurelius?

5. Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall secretly leased two oil reserves in California and Wyoming to private oil companies in 1922. In return, he received as much as \$400,000 in kickbacks. For ten points, name this scandal that occurred during the Harding administration.
